## **MATCH REPORT ROUNDUP**

#### **ASCOT SLUMP TO THATCHAM DEFEAT**

Ten men lose 2-0 in poor display

Tuesday 14th November 2023, Pitching In Isthmian League South Central, Thatcham Town 2 - O Ascot United



Josh Edwards was sent off against his former club as Ascot United lost 2-0 at Thatcham Town on Tuesday evening. In a dismal spectacle, The Yellamen improved after going a man down and hit the woodwork three times, but lady luck was not in their camp on as a desperate Thatcham side took all three points.

#### **FA Vase winners go head to head**

This match up pitched the current FA Vase holders with the former holders — The Kingfishers having triumphed five years before The Yellamen way back in 2018 – but five years later both sides were looking for league points to propel them away from the lower half of the table, and also to build on their respective recent wins over basement side Binfield. The Yellamen made three changes from Saturday's starting line-up – Laflin, McCormack and Bailey in for Tucker, Balogun and Killeen – and after Waterside Park had survived an earlier deluge prompting a 4pm pitch inspection it was game on.

#### Horrible, lifeless first half

The first half was just about as bad as it could get as ex-Kingfisher Edwards conceded a penalty inside three minutes; Christian Johnson easily rolling his effort into the left. After that, Thatcham's Harry Hoath saw his 27th minute effort parried by Hugo Sobte before Sobte blocked Sam Tanner's follow-up, although defender Josh Blackwood should really have converted a free header from the resultant corner Sobte's save in the 43rd minute and another missed free header from a corner ensured Ascot escaped the half only one goal behind, whilst the best effort they could muster was Harry Grant's effort that struck his own player in the shape of Laflin in the 39th minute.

#### Wood you believe it?!


Incredibly, the three minute mark brought more woes for Edwards who saw red in the 48th minute for denying a clear goal-scoring opportunity. But the ten men tried hard and struck the woodwork thrice; firstly when Sean McCormack hit the crossbar after 'keeper Callum Smart had spilt Chris Ellis's log throw-in, then when Brendan Matthew's shot cannoned back off an upright following Grant's corner, and most agonisingly when Ollie Harris's brilliant free kick thumped the inside of the frame in the game's dying embers.

In-and-around all of that Thatcham wasted another glut of free headers, but they added the killer second when countering directly in the aftermath of Matthew striking a post in the 77th minute – Hoath led the march and David Nyarko swept home from close range – and what was almost 1-1 with a fair chunk of time still to play became 0-2 within a matter of seconds. Jordan Ajanlekoko exited with a shoulder injury earlier on, compounding Ascot's misery. Manager Jamie Tompkins kept his side out long after the final whistle, but the smattering of loyal travelling fans stayed even longer to show their support for their team as they walked off.

It's a rollercoaster, and with every up comes a down.

OUR front page headline in The NLP on Sunday read "Sweet 16", depicting the surprise number of upsets in the FA Trophy that day.

In all, no fewer than 26 of the 48 National League North and South teams exited Non-League's primary cup competition last Saturday, almost two-thirds of these by lower league opposition.

Monday's third round draw included four Step 4 clubs who had made their way to the last 64, including City of Liverpool and Nantwich Town, who flew the flag for NPL Division One West with victory over National League North pair Buxton and Chester respectively.

Elsewhere, NPL Midlands side Walsall Wood were triumphant at Hemel Hempstead Town, while Southern League Frome Town dumped out Worthing on penalties.

And Isthmian South East Hythe Town rounded off a day of shocks by dumping out Kent rivals Tonbridge Angels.

But, look back at the records though and you'll see that statistics like this are actually not as unusual as you'd think for this stage of the FA Trophy.

For years; many saw the Trophy as a drain on an already hectic schedule for little financial reward, hence why it ranked low on a top-flight manager's pre-season priority list.

Measures have been put in place to help balance this out, such as scrapping twolegged semi-finals in recent seasons, but it appears the stigma that has plagued the competition over the years remains.

So, my question is, with its overall prestige and, of course, the carrot of the ultimate reward in football – a historic day out under the Wembley arch – does the FA Trophy deserve a little more love from boards and managers alike?

As far as the boards are concerned, traditionally, third round weekend is one of the most underwhelming on the football calendar; played on the final Saturday before Christmas and to significantly reduced attendances given that Trophy ties are not often included as part of regular season ticket packages.

This year's FA Trophy winners will pocket a £60,000 purse – not to be sniffed at, of course, but still a fraction of what can be earned for a blockbuster FA Cup tie, as enjoyed by the likes of Sheppey United, Horsham and Cray Valley PM already this year.

For managers either battling for honours at the top end of the National League for looking to escape the lower reaches, any further strain on an already hectic league schedule is never going to be popular.

This may well be the reason why clubs from the second and even third tiers of Non-League football have historically fared so well.

In the last decade alone, North Ferriby (2014-15), Brackley Town (2017-18) and Hornchurch (2020-21) have lifted the trophy while playing outside the top-flight, while Gosport Borough (2013-14), Concord Rangers (2019-20) and Hereford (2020-21) were losing finalists.

Indeed, you have to go back to 1993 to the last time a Conference and FA Trophy double was completed when Wycombe Wanderers doubled up under Martin O'Neill. Wealdstone (1984-85) and Colchester United (1991-92) are the only other double winners, although, in recent years, Cambridge United (2013-14) and York City (2016-17) have come mighty close to joining them having won the Trophy and promotion to the Football League through the play-offs.

Trio Stevenage Borough (2009-10), Grimsby Town (2015-16) and Leyton Orient (2018-19) all won promotion while losing the final showcase at Wembley, while Wrexham did things the other way round in 2012-13, winning the FA Trophy in March but then losing the play-off promotion final to Newport County two months later.

And in 2019-20, Harrogate Town became the only EFL club to lift the Trophy when they were returned from the Covid hiatus in September 2020 to see off a Concord Rangers side from two leagues below by the solitary goal.

It all shows that, despite requiring an almighty effort, it IS possible to combine a fifth tier title challenge with an FA Trophy run, although very few will boast the strength in depth afforded by Lincoln City bosses Danny and Nicky Cowley in 2016-17, who could afford to field an entire second string side for the FA Trophy, dubbed the Lincoln Lizards, and went all the way to the semi-finals where they lost to York who, coincidentally, were relegated that season.

Current holders FC Halifax Town and their National League rivals begin their 2023-24 FA Trophy assault in a fortnight's time with history once again in the making.

The Weighley draw awaits two of the final 64 on Non League Finals Day next May.



## **CLUB HISTORY - ASCOT UNITED**

Ascot United as we know it, was founded in 1965 by a men's team who played their games at Sunninghill with "after match meetings" in The Wells in Cheapside village (now Mikado's). Teams played as long ago as 1928 under the name "Ascot United" but nothing to link them directly to the current club. In 1965, the club had gained permission from the Ascot Racecourse Trustees to convert the land east of coach park 10 into a football pitch. A wooden clubhouse was built, and this team went on to win many prestigious trophies in the years that followed.

Various youth teams represented Ascot United over the years up to 1988, and in 1992 the East Berks 7-a-side Association was formed by our then Chairman Keith Wicks, introducing small-sided junior games and having disbanded in 1980 the men's team also reformed. The men's senior team enjoyed early success through the East Berks League gaining continued promotions to the Senior division and winning various Cups including the Fielden Charity Cup in 1996/7. In 2001, the First Team join the Reading Senior League, were awarded FA Charter Standard status in 2004, and won the Reading Evening Post Senior Cup at the Madejski Stadium in 2006. Promotion to the Hellenic League Division 1 soon followed in 2007, before promotion to the Premier Division in 2009.

"The Yellamen" made their debut in the FA Cup in 2011 with a home tie against Wembley FC. The game attracted 1,149 people to The Racecourse on a Friday evening where the famous trophy itself was on display, and the match was streamed live on Facebook. In 2012-13 and 2015-16 we reached the Quarter Final of the FA Vase twice, enjoyed two top-three finishes in the Uhlsport Hellenic League Premier Division, and won both the Bluefin Sport Challenge Cup and Perpetua Press Floodlit Cup. In 2018-19, new manager Jamie Tompkins led his side to the top of the table for long spells, and although they couldn't hang on to their lead, they would taste league cup glory once again by defeating Windsor FC 3-1.

A lateral move to the Combined Counties Premier Division for the 2019-20 season, combined with the installation of a new 3G pitch provided a platform for further development both on and off the pitch. The Yellamen were clear at the top of the league before COVID curtailed their first crack at the title before the 2021-22 season saw them reach the Bucks Senior Cup Final after defeating three sides from higher divisions, including Wycombe Wanderers in the semi-final in front of a club-record crowd of 1.267.

However, it is the 2022-23 campaign that will surely remain the club's most successful for decades to come. Tompkins' side dominated the league, taking 102 points from 38 league matches to win the title with four matches to spare. And if that wasn't enough, they achieved an incredible double by lifting the Isuzu FA Vase at Wembley in front of over 4,400 travelling Ascot United supporters and the BT Sport cameras. Impressively, they entered in the very first qualifying round before winning ten matches in a mesmerizing run; Kai Walters heading home in the 79th minute to secure a 1-0 win over the then-holders Newport Pagnell Town.

The club has also enjoyed much success at all levels particularly in the Women's and Girls Section. Our Senior Women won promotion to the Premier Division of the Southern Region Women's' Football League in 2017-18 and enjoyed their best season in 2022-23 when they were runners-up but ended on a high by winning the league cup. Our Women's Phoenix side achieved back-to-back promotions from the Thames Valley League to take their place just one level below the Senior side for 2023-24, and the newly-formed Junior Premier League (U18s) also won their league title at the first attempt in 2022-23.

Ascot United has grown to become one of the largest Community football clubs in the UK with over 1,000 registered players and over 90 teams playing every weekend embracing all ages and abilities from 5 year olds through to veterans. We are also extremely proud to have a mixed-ability team representing our club, the Ascot United Warriors, who are affiliated with Special Olympics GB. The future is bright.



## **CLUB HISTORY - MARLOW**

It was on November 22nd 1870 at the Compleat Angler Hotel on the banks of the Thames that Great Marlow Football Club was formed and so began the history of one of the oldest clubs in the country. In the last century the Club was a major force in the game and as one of the original entrants in the first F.A Cup competition in 1871/72 contributed a share of the £25 that bought the first trophy. In the very first year of the competition a certain Cuthbert Ottaway turned out for Marlow and just a year later he was to captain the national side against Scotland in the first ever officially recognised international match.

Marlow have the unique distinction of being the only club to have applied for entry to every competition since its inception although they were unable to compete once in the 1910/11 season. In 1882 they reached the semi-finals where they lost out to eventual winners Old Etonians 0-5 at the Oval. Two Amateur Cup semi-finals and a host of Berks & Bucks Senior Cup wins were among many honours won in this golden age. In 1894 Marlow rejected the opportunity to join the newly-formed Southern League in order to retain their amateur status and allowed Tottenham Hotspur to begin their climb to the top flight by taking their place

The Club's ground until 1919 was Crown Meadow, now the Riley Recreational Ground. An enforced move to the Star Meadow (which was unfenced) and the worsening financial situation resulted in the need to play in a more local competition than the Great Western Suburban League and Marlow joined the Reading and District League. This was a dark period for the Club and worse was to come when the Club's long-serving Honorary Secretary Alfred Davis, who had held office at the Club since 1891, died in 1924. It was decided that a fitting memorial to him would be to provide a permanent home for Marlow F.C. An appeal proved to be very successful and the "Alfred Davis Memorial Ground" saw its first game in 1928. The picturesque grandstand dates from 1930's and followed the establishment of an Association who issued Share Certificates in connection with a Building Fund and was built to celebrate the Club's revival and the Spartan League Division Two championship.

Apart from a war-time break Marlow continued in the Spartan League until 1965 when entry was gained to the Athenian League Division Two. Promotion to Division One was secured in season 1970/71. Here Marlow remained until 1984 when they joined the Isthmian League. Having finished bottom of Division Two in 1985 the appointment of Mike Keen as Manager heralded a rapid rise in status. Promotion to Division One came the very next season and then after just one season in Division One the championship was won after a two horse race with Grays Athletic and along with it promotion to the Premier Division.

Here Marlow found things much tougher and Christmas arrived without a win and from a position at the foot of the table r however a late season Houdini act saw them escape and secure their new-found status. When Keen left his assistant Dave Russell took over and brought in Laurie Craker as Coach. Under them good times returned and the Berks & Bucks Senior Cup was won for the first time that century with a victory over local rivals Wycombe Wanderers and the F.A Cup First Round was reached, also for the first time that century, with an away tie at West Bromwich Albion the reward. Season 1992/93 saw even more F.A Cup success with progression this time to the Third Round and a tie with Tottenham Hotspur that was switched to White Hart Lane where almost 27000 saw the Blues give a very creditable performance. The Diadora (Isthmian) League Cup was won to finish the season on a high note by beating Molesey.

1993/94 must rate as the most successful ever with Marlow again reaching the First Round of the F.A Cup where a 0-2 home defeat against Plymouth Argyle was featured on T.V, while in the league a highest-ever position of third was achieved. The Berks & Bucks Senior Cup was won again with a 1-0 win over local rivals Chesham Utd. to round off a highly memorable season.

At the end of that season Russell and Craker left for Slough Town and took several players with them. A new squad and slow start left a lot to do in the league and relegation followed. In the F.A Cup things were very different. The First Round saw Division Two table-toppers Oxford Utd. defeated 2-0 at Oak Tree Road and the Blues became the first winners of the Littlewoods Pools' Giant Killers award. After another home victory over Trophy holder's Woking secured a place in the Third Round Proper once again and a trip to Swindon Town, who had been in the Premier League the season before, where the home side were grateful to progress by a 2-0 scoreline.





## **CLUB HISTORY - MARLOW**

Season 1995/96 saw a finish in in eighth spot but the following one got off to a terrible start from which the Club was never able to recover – and despite victories over virtually all the top sides, relegation was confirmed on the last day of the season. Russell returned for the following season and with him high hopes but the season proved to be one of under-achievement and a new team of Graham Pritchard and Derek Sweetman took over for 1998/99 and provided a period of stability which saw finishes in mid-table. Following the departure of Pritchard just before season 2001/02 Sweetman took over the reins and his first game in charge saw the capture of the Associate Members Trophy in a final held over from the previous season. The side finished the season in 9th position in the league – the highest for some time – before restructuring saw them move from Division Two to the newly-formed Division One North for season 2002/03 where an 11th place finish was achieved. In the FA Trophy they progressed to the Third Round before going out at Dagenham & Redbridge. Marlow were moved yet again to Division One South and although inconsistent form saw them finish 16th in the league they again had an excellent run in the FA Trophy which took them to the Fourth Round for the first time in their history. Several notable victories saw them through before a strong Tamworth outfit ended their run at Oak Tree Road.

The reorganization of the non-league game saw them in different surroundings for the fourth time in four seasons with entry into The Southern League, Western Division for season 2004/05 and a finishing 13th spot. Kevin Stone had moved into the manager's seat towards the end of the season and enjoyed a great run. 2005/06 and in the same league and in more familiar surroundings seemed to suit the side and for most of the season they hovered around the play-off positions and eventually finished in 6th spot. A play-off spot was confirmed on the final day of the season and although a 1-2 defeat at Brackley Town followed the Club were pleased with the progress. Season 2006/07 in the South & West Division saw a successful run of results promise another play-off berth but a last day defeat at Winchester City saw them fall just short whilst season 2007/08 was a little more disappointing with some very good results failing to offset a poor run around February/March with a final finish just outside the play-offs following..

Season 2008/09 saw the Club moved yet again into the Midland Division and another inconsistent season followed finishing with a defeat to Windsor & Eton in the final of the Berks & Bucks Senior Cup at M.K Dons stadium. The following two seasons saw some good results against the top sides but indifferent ones against the lower teams and ended with mid-table finishes even though a bright start in 2010/11 saw them briefly at the top of the table. 2011/12 did not start at all badly but soon developed into one where victories were very hard to come by and following a string of poor results long-standing manager Stone left just after Christmas. Assistant Steve Croxford took over and although performances and results improved towards the end it was not enough to avoid relegation.

Season 2012/13 found Marlow in in the Uhlsport Hellenic League with a new management team headed by Mark Bartley eager to recapture some of the glories of the past and this they did, winning the league championship by a 16 point margin and scoring 123 goals in 36 games to return to the Southern League where the next two seasons saw them consolidate with finishes in and 17th and 11th positions respectively.

For 2015/16 Marlow were moved once again – to the South & West division – which again meant increased travelling and the loss of some key players and several local derbies, making life much more difficult and a mid-table finish was achieved. A return to the Central Division for 2016/17 aided a finish in 4th place (on goal difference) and achieved a play-off place, with third-placed Barton Rovers running out 2-0 victors at their ground. Season 2017/18 saw a mid-table finish followed by a return to the Isthmian League after a lengthy absence to take a place in the newly-formed South-Central division with a resultant reduction in travelling which is most welcome. Here generally good results saw them maintain a position near the top of the table throughout the season and qualify for the play-offs where they lost out in the semi-final to eventual winners Cheshunt 1-2 on their ground. Back "home" the Blues have settled in and despite the curtailment of the next 2 seasons have retained the core of those players and added some quality for 2021/2022.

Last season saw an excellent start and a position at or near the top of the table throughout but a dismal run of results in the final months lost the early momentum. What it did do however was to highlight the quality of the squad and lead to many players being poached to join clubs at a higher level in the pyramid giving Manager Bartley the task of rebuilding the squad as he enters his eleventh season at the helm.
