We are a campaign dedicated to pressuring Dai Yongge into selling Reading Football Club.

We are a club in massive trouble right now. During Mr Dai's tenure, 16 points have been deducted, we've been under a transfer embargo for around five years now, wages haven't been paid on time on multiple occasions, winding up petitions have been launched, sponsors have stepped in to cover player payroll, caterers have been removed from the training ground, staff are demoralised, players are reportedly being sold behind the manager and sporting director's back and two firstteam coaches have been made redundant.

Some of these issues are worse than others, but combined, they have been disastrous and this has led to fans worrying about whether their club will be in existence at the end of the season. The prospect of back-to-back relegations is scary enough, but the thought of liquidation is unbearable.

We want our children and grandchildren to follow in our footsteps and support the club in the future. That is no longer a certainty thanks to Mr Dai and his sister Dai Xiu Li, who were tasked with taking care of this football club but have run it into the ground instead. Both of them need to be removed as quickly as possible.

Local teams who have benefitted and may continue to benefit from having some of our players on loan in the future would also benefit from an ownership change, with our young players also profiting from gaining some valuable experience.

What are our hopes for the future?

We don't care about spending millions, we just want a fully functioning football club to support. Our situation has worsened considerably in recent months and the constant cycle of bad news is neverending.

Whatever league we find ourselves in, we just need stability and a form of escape from the realities of life. At the moment, supporting the Royals is anything but that, and that's a massive shame because we used to be run incredibly well by Sir John Madejski.

In the short term, we need to save the club. As a campaign and fanbase, we will keep pushing until a sale is complete and having fans of all clubs onside will help to make that happen. Let's make Reading Football Club a Dai-free zone.

MATCH REPORT ROUNDUP

LIAM'S SPOT-ON AS ASCOT BEAT CHIPSTEAD

Tack's penalty enough for Yellamen



Saturday 10th February 2024 , Pitching In Isthmian League South Central, Ascot United 1 -0 Chipstead

Liam Tack's first half penalty was enough for Ascot United as they edged out Chipstead on Saturday. Tack's effort, awarded after a foul on George Lock, was the highlight of an otherwise stale first half before a second period littered with chances.

All change please! Team and trend on the agenda

Both sides were looking for an upturn in form with Ascot and Chipstead's last six games yielding five and two points respectively. And, much had changed in the hosts' squad since their reverse-fixture defeat in October – Sobte, Case, Killeen, Matthew, Ajanlekoko, Surpanu, Welch and Balogun having all since departed – but with Ben Harris, Liam Tack, Mark Scott, and Taylor Morgan recruited alongside matchday new-boys Ewan Lynch and Ollie Mason.

Before kick-off, defender Lock received an award for reaching 250 appearances one week earlier, although Usman Lalustani's 100th appearance went on ice for at least another two weeks after illness ruled him out of the matchday squad.

Double injury blow for hosts but Chips pay the penalty

The first half was largely uneventful other than a late catalogue of errors that led to Ascot's half time lead, although the visitors almost scored in the sixth minute when Mark Scott tipped Danyaal lqbaal's rising effort over after a fine, driving run from Daniel Berry who rode his way through a handful of attempted challenges. At the other end the Yellamen failed to forge a clear opportunity of their own, and were forced to reshuffle when Sean McCormack hobbled off midway through the half holding his hamstring – adding to Harry Laflin who pulled up in the warm-up in similar circumstances – although substitute Lynch got his moment as a result. And, it was Lynch's cross that led to Ascot's opener, although in fairness it was poor – although so was Bradley Wilson's awful attempted clearance – but defender Alfie Young eclipsed that with a poor challenge on Lock for a stonewall penalty. Up stepped Tack, and he netted the spot-kick into the bottom left; 35 minutes played and that is how it remained at half-time.

Yellas should have sewn it up before Chips rally late-on

Nine minutes into the second half, visiting 'keeper Harrison made a fine double save to keep his side in it, firstly blocking Harry Grant's shot after Morgan had dug out an inviting left-wing cross that Firth had initially cut out, before Ollie Harris saw his first effort from the rebound blocked and a follow-up also saved by Firth. At the other end, defender Daniel Vaughan's wayward header from a corner went begging, although his side showed more intent in the final fifteen minutes as Berry wriggled through a couple of challenges before firing over and Scott saved smartly from the same player after Wilson had played him in.

In between those chances Ascot threatened again from an unlikely source – the left boot of Chris Ellis – but he did well to fashion a leftfooted effort from a tight angle that Firth dealt with. The excellent Ben Harris lasted 75 minutes in an end-to-end display – backing up a powerful attacking display with defensive work in his own penalty area – before Dan Bailey replaced the man-of-the-match. After that, Chipstead wasted their best chance in the 89th minute when substitute Jacob Sewell somehow scooped his effort over the crossbar at the far post after Berry's deep cross had picked him out, although in seven minutes of added time there was still time for the two sides to trade more chances as Morgan's shot nicked off a defender and over for an Ascot corner before Ollie Lahtinen-Kalsi's brave intervention deep into stoppage time thwarted one last throw of the Chips' dice.



IN THE week where the sporting world stood still for the Taylor Swift show (aka, the Super Bowl), our very own live TV showcase was entering the spotlight.

While the pop superstar took centre stage during the most-watched sporting event across the Atlantic, the Football Association here were finalising terms for a four-year, multi-million pound deal with TNT Sports to show the FA Cup from the 2025-26 season.

As part of the agreement, TNT Sports, who have won many plaudits this season for their coverage of the National League and even North and South, will share the rights with a free-to-air broadcaster.

As part of the deal, all games from the third round onwards outside of 3pm kick-offs will be broadcast live, while the Wembley final will be shown on both TNT Sports and free-to-air.

At present, and for the past four seasons, the BBC and ITV currently share rights for the FA Cup and details of the extent of the involvement of free-to-air channels covering FA Cup games will be announced in due course.

TNT Sports, however, insist the deal, reportedly worth £66million-per-year - an increase of 15 per cent on the current deal – "will ensure that the world's longest-running national knockout football competition continues to be as broadly available as possible across the UK".

"Selected matches from every round will be available free-to-air, and highlights of every game will be made available," they said in a statement.

In his NLP column this week, Matt Badcock outlined the pros and cons of the new deal amidst a rather mixed social media reaction with critics suggesting having fewer FA Cup games shown live on free-to-air television hammers another nail in the world's most famous cup competition.

But, as Matt rightly pointed out, FA Cup ties being played behind a 'paywall' is nothing new. Sky Sports, Setanta, ESPN and BT Sport have all had deals in the past with another channel showing games free.

And, let's not forget, games will be free-to-air under this deal too. We just we don't yet know by who.

Suggestions are at least two games per round will be free to view – as well as one semi-final and the final – but, clearly, having stumped up the big bucks, TNT will dictate what they have.

From a Non-League point of view, that won't be such a bad thing if they put National League teams on the games. As mentioned earlier, their coverage of the National League this season has been exemplary.

Far from some of the patronising coverage Non-League often has to put up with in the past, the TNT commentary team led by Adam Summerton and including the likes of very own Adam Virgo and Aaron McLean tell the National League story with knowledge and passion, capturing some of the division's biggest moments as if it were a Champions League final.

Crucially, Matt also points out that while opinion is shared on the deal, the real focus should be on the extra revenue and what it can do.

FA Cup TV money is a key revenue stream for the FA to invest back into the game. A lot of good can be done with it and there are good people at Wembley who know that.

The fall-out from Covid saw the prize pot slashed. Having seen it doubled from previous years, it had to be trimmed back again with the Women's FA Cup – quite rightly – benefitting as a result.

It's vital for the Non-League and lower league game that the FA Cup fund is topped up again - especially in the early rounds where so many clubs have a chance at bringing in money on sporting merit rather than status alone.

We believe Non-League football deserves as many eyes on it as possible. And, of course, some more cash in the kitty. ~Jon Couch

Ascot United as we know it, was founded in 1965 by a men's team who played their games at Sunninghill with "after match meetings" in The Wells in Cheapside village (now Mikado's). Teams played as long ago as 1928 under the name "Ascot United" but nothing to link them directly to the current club. In 1965, the club had gained permission from the Ascot Racecourse Trustees to convert the land east of coach park 10 into a football pitch. A wooden clubhouse was built, and this team went on to win many prestigious trophies in the years that followed.

Various youth teams represented Ascot United over the years up to 1988, and in 1992 the East Berks 7-a-side Association was formed by our then Chairman Keith Wicks, introducing small-sided junior games and having disbanded in 1980 the men's team also reformed. The men's senior team enjoyed early success through the East Berks League gaining continued promotions to the Senior division and winning various Cups including the Fielden Charity Cup in 1996/7. In 2001, the First Team join the Reading Senior League, were awarded FA Charter Standard status in 2004, and won the Reading Evening Post Senior Cup at the Madejski Stadium in 2006. Promotion to the Hellenic League Division 1 soon followed in 2007, before promotion to the Premier Division in 2009.

"The Yellamen" made their debut in the FA Cup in 2011 with a home tie against Wembley FC. The game attracted 1,149 people to The Racecourse on a Friday evening where the famous trophy itself was on display, and the match was streamed live on Facebook. In 2012-13 and 2015-16 we reached the Quarter Final of the FA Vase twice, enjoyed two topthree finishes in the Uhlsport Hellenic League Premier Division, and won both the Bluefin Sport Challenge Cup and Perpetua Press Floodlit Cup. In 2018-19, new manager Jamie Tompkins led his side to the top of the table for long spells, and although they couldn't hang on to their lead, they would taste league cup glory once again by defeating Windsor FC 3-1.

A lateral move to the Combined Counties Premier Division for the 2019-20 season, combined with the installation of a new 3G pitch provided a platform for further development both on and off the pitch. The Yellamen were clear at the top of the league before COVID curtailed their first crack at the title before the 2021-22 season saw them reach the Bucks Senior Cup Final after defeating three sides from higher divisions, including Wycombe Wanderers in the semi-final in front of a club-record crowd of 1,267.

However, it is the 2022-23 campaign that will surely remain the club's most successful for decades to come. Tompkins' side dominated the league, taking 102 points from 38 league matches to win the title with four matches to spare. And if that wasn't enough, they achieved an incredible double by lifting the Isuzu FA Vase at Wembley in front of over 4,400 travelling Ascot United supporters and the BT Sport cameras. Impressively, they entered in the very first qualifying round before winning ten matches in a mesmerizing run; Kai Walters heading home in the 79th minute to secure a 1-0 win over the then-holders Newport Pagnell Town.

The club has also enjoyed much success at all levels particularly in the Women's and Girls Section. Our Senior Women won promotion to the Premier Division of the Southern Region Women's' Football League in 2017-18 and enjoyed their best season in 2022-23 when they were runners-up but ended on a high by winning the league cup. Our Women's Phoenix side achieved back-to-back promotions from the Thames Valley League to take their place just one level below the Senior side for 2023-24, and the newly-formed Junior Premier League (U18s) also won their league title at the first attempt in 2022-23.

Ascot United has grown to become one of the largest Community football clubs in the UK with over 1,000 registered players and over 90 teams playing every weekend embracing all ages and abilities from 5 year olds through to veterans. We are also extremely proud to have a mixed-ability team representing our club, the Ascot United Warriors, who are affiliated with Special Olympics GB. The future is bright.



CLUB HISTORY - CORINTHIAN CASUALS

The newly amalgamated Corinthian-Casuals Football Club had played only one game before World War II broke out and the league was suspended. Remarkably, the team made the decision to tour France in the spring of 1940 as part of a Red Cross party, however they were forced to return home in haste when the German offensive was launched on May 10th. Come the recommencement of football in 1945, the new club proudly took Casuals' old place in the Isthmian League, where it would remain for another 39 years. It was decided that they would wear the famous chocolate and pink colours of the Casuals for their home matches, and Corinthian white away.

In 1954, the club beat Epsom 2-0 to win the Surrey Senior Cup. Two years later in 1956, they reached the FA Amateur Cup Final, drawing 1-1 with Bishop Auckland at a packed Wembley Stadium. However the legendary north-eastern club won the replay at Middlesbrough 4-1. A year later, another good run in the FA Amateur Cup saw Corinthian-Casuals reach the semi-final where they eventually succumbed to Wycombe Wanderers at Highbury. After this high point, the club slipped into a long decline, a rare moment of success seeing them reach the FA Cup 1st Round in 1965/66, where Watford won 5-1.

The 1973/74 season was a historic milestone; heralding the FA's decision to abolish official 'Amateur' status. As if in empathy with the end of the amateur era, Corinthian-Casuals steadfastly refused to accept the new 'semi-professionalism' and were relegated, for the first time in their history, into Isthmian League Division 2. Further relegation followed after a third bottom finish in four years. Then, in 1984, new ground-sharing rules summarily introduced by the Isthmian League saw the club unceremoniously thrown out of the league after 65 years of continuous membership (and in spite of a 5th place finish!) simply because the club's long nomadic history meant it shared a ground and thus did not have one of its own (imagine that today!!). Ironically, the year this occurred was the club's best in quite a while. Casuals reached the 1st Round of the FA Cup, holding Bristol City to a goalless draw at Champion Hill, before losing 4-0 in the replay. The club also made it to the 5th Round of the FA Vase, the replacement competition for the FA Amateur Cup.

1988 was a truly historic year as the club, in addition to touring Brazil, finally secured its first ever home ground, taking over the lease at King George's Field from the crippled Tolworth FC. A colossal effort from the club's members helped to transform the ground - installing turnstiles, terracing and seating, as well as completing the construction of the clubhouse. A runners-up berth in 1993 and winning the League Cup in 1995 were the highlights of the Spartan League era, before the club switched to the Combined Counties League in 1996. This was a greatly improved experience. In the first season, a runners-up spot was achieved to at last win back our place in the Isthmian League.

In 2000/01, a 5th place finish - the team's best finish for many years - saw them miss promotion by a meagre three points, whilst the Reserves won the Suburban League South and London Intermediate Cup.

In May 2001, the club toured Brazil again, winning the Sao Paulo Athletic Invitation Cup. Victories were achieved over Paulistano and Sao Paulo AC, though SC Corinthians Paulista's U21's inflicted a 2-0 defeat.

The next season saw the reorganization of the Isthmian League, with a top 6 finish guaranteeing a place in the new Division 1 South. Despite being in the running for much of the season, a late slump saw the Corinthian-Casuals slip to finish in 10th place. However, thanks to some astute thinking, the ground had been improved anyway, gaining a "Grade B" award. Thus, due to circumstances elsewhere, the promotion places sank to as low as 11th and the club got to play its highest level of football since 1978. Season 2006/07 saw regime change. Brian Adamson was appointed as new manager and hopes were lifted towards an improvement in fortunes. The season was certainly a tale of two halves, with the club eventually finishing second from bottom with more points than they had achieved since 2004/05, a somewhat pleasing 34. The team were very young, the maiority without Isthmian level experience, and needed to gain that experience quickly. Up until December, it looked like the team would never get above 10 points. Luck did not seem to be on their side, frequently losing by a single goal. But they played exciting football, all with a speed and passion that had not been seen for several years at the Tolworth ground. With the arrival of the New Year, fortunes changed and the team produced a run of seven games without defeat. They continued with mixed fortunes, right up to the final game of the season. Here they needed to beat Leatherhead to get off the bottom of the table to be in with any hope of avoiding relegation. The 3-1 victory achieved just that, thanks also to the late merger of Hayes & Yeading.

While the 1st XI were finding Lady Luck a little fickle with her favours, the Reserves were steadily working their way up the Suburban Premier table. They showed strong nerves when beating Sutton United in the Champions Cup semi-final 2nd Leg, coming from behind to win 2-1 on aggregate. And then in the final, when they beat Waltham Forest 4-2 on penalties, following two hours of football and as many goals apiece. Their second trophy came from a rematch of the previous season's London FA Intermediate Cup final. This time the Reserves held their nerve to beat Metrogas 5-4 on penalties.

In 2008 the club enjoyed the momentous honour of celebrating 125 years of football with a commemorative match at Wembley Stadium. After staying up on merit for four consecutive seasons it is clear that the hard work, vision and dedication of management team, Brian Adamson, Kim Harris and Keith Holloway, was beginning to pay dividends.

The 2010/11 season was the most memorable for many years as the club lifted the Surrey Senior Cup for the first time in 57 years when Leatherhead were defeated 2-0 in the final at Gander Green Lane. This triumph was a fitting tribute to Brian Adamson who stood down as manager at the end of the season to be replaced by Matt Howard.

In 2015 Corinthian-Casuals returned to Brazil to take on SC Corinthians Paulista's First XI for the first time in an historic match organised to celebrate the the opening of the Brazilian club's brand new stadium, Arena Corinthians, and to commemorate the centenary of the Corinthian tour which had been abandoned due to the outbreak of World War One.

Predictably, the Sao Paulo team came out on top, eventually winning 3-0 in front of 40,000 spectators, but Casuals were welcomed as heroes by the locals in a truly memorable tour which was superbly documented in the BT Sports film 'Brothers In Football'.

James Bracken's arrival as Manager at the start of the 2015/16 season heralded the start of an exciting new era at Corinthian Casuals and the club only missed out on a spot in the play-offs due to a controversial points deduction. However, the following season saw the club reach the play-off Final, drawing 0-0 at Dorking Wanderers only to be cruelly denied promotion following a penalty shoot-out.

Despite the disappointment, James led Corinth to their second consecutive play-off Final in 2017/18. Sadly, once more the team were to fall at the last hurdle, losing the Final in yet another penalty shoot-out. However, due to Thurrock's resignation from the League, Corinthian-Casuals earned promotion to Step 3 as the losing Finalist with the best points-per-game average over the season. Casuals entered the Isthmian Premier Division 2018/19 season with excitement and anticipation and successfully retained their position in the League.

In the summer of 2019, The club made its first foray into Europe for many years, participating in the inaugural Egri Erbstein Tournament in Hungary. Thus, 115 years after the Corinthians first toured Europe, the team returned to Budapest - the site of their first ever game on the continent.

The occasion was celebrated by the UK Ambassador to Hungary, Iain Lindsay, OBE, who hosted a reception at the Embassy in the club's honour.

After beating Budapest Atletikai Klub (BAK) in the semi-final, Casuals triumphed 1-0 over Testveriseg SE with a last minute winner in the final to lift the trophy in Budapest.

The 2021-22 season would be James' last as he moved on to challenges new. Following the departures of Tony Reid and Justin Fevrier in 2022-23 and relegation to the Isthmian League South Central Division, Corinthian-Casuals legend Andy Gray was appointed Manager and took over the helm from interim Manager Brian Adamson at the start of the 2023-24 season. Sadly, Andy was unable to convert his love for the club into results on the field and, with the team languishing in the relegation places at Christmas, the decision was made to replace him.

Former Dulwich Hamlet and Hasting Utd manager Paul Barnes was appointed First Team Manager at the end of December and now leads the club into 2024 with renewed hope.

Corinthian-Casuals Football Club continues to take great pride in our rich and glorious history, as well as in our present day standing as the highest ranked amateur club in England.
