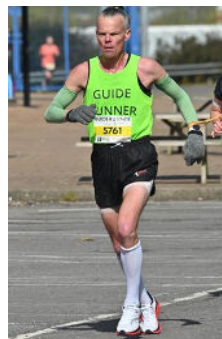

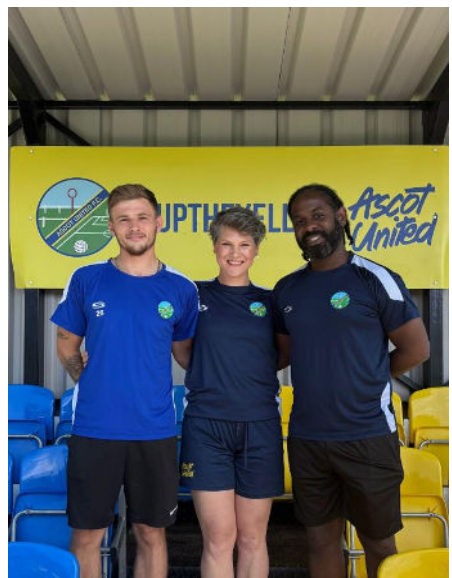

ASCOT WOMEN LOSE HEAVILY ON OPENING DAY



Gwalia score six in chastening curtain-raiser

Ascot United Women opened up their National League South West campaign with a 6-0 defeat against Gwalia United on Sunday afternoon. The hosts trailed inside two minutes and were four-nil down at half time, and but for a string of fine saves from 'keeper Emily Evans, the margin of defeat would have been a lot higher.

Tough Task for Yellowwomen on opening day

On paper, this game was just about as tough as they come. New manager Aym'e Melham had assembled a completely new squad for Ascot's second season at Step four, and they would face Gwalia United – littered with players boasting International Experience at both senior and junior level in their native Wales – and were only relegated from Step three on goal difference at the end of last season. Based only a few miles north of Cardiff, they dropped their original Cardiff City Ladies name for the start of the 2024/25 season and adopted Gwalia with a nod to the ancient Welsh term for their nation. But that was largely inconsequential on a mercifully cooler opening afternoon in the National League, as they would certainly announce their arrival at Step four.

Gwalia totally dominant in one-sided first-half

The parity at kick-off lasted just 100 seconds as Megan Kehoe was on-hand to convert from close range following the first of one of United's plethora of first-half corners; 1-0 to the Welsh side. To their credit, Ascot steadied the ship and there were some glimpses of hope – mainly through the determination of forward Symana Zayadi. But it was 2-0 when Manon Pearce's cross from the left ended with a first-time finish courtesy of Esme Kilburn-Thompson before Pearce herself easily curled over home 'keeper Evans – centre of goal – to make it 3-0 in the 35th minute. Issy Newns inexplicably stabbed wide at the near post and Evans saved brilliantly from Summer Evans's rising drive when she went clean through, but Esme-Thompson would add a fourth in first-half stoppage time with a deft flick from directly in front of Evans. Ascot's only sight of goal came when Macey Walters scuffed her shot wide from long-range just after her side had gone 2-0 down.

Second half follows similar pattern before Ascot keep final half-hour goalless

Incredibly, the visitors would strike the woodwork twice inside the opening 75 seconds of the second half when firstly (number fifteen!) struck a post before Pearce clattered the crossbar from long range when following up. Kilburn-Thompson was then denied by a sensational diving save from Evans – sprawling across her area – but Summer Evans found the top right-hand corner with a speculative free kick from just inside Ascot's area; 50 minutes played and 5-0. But Walters had Ascot's cleanest sight of goal moments later when, clean through, she drew a low save from Norwegian 'keeper Benedicte Haaland with a thumping low drive.

However, Evans was powerless to prevent number six in the 57th minute. This time, she produced another brilliant save from close range to bravely thwart Kehoe from Pearce's cross, only for Kilburn-Thompson to tap the rebound into an empty net and complete her treble. Cerys Jones and Kylie Nolan linked up for Kehoe in the 63rd minute, but Evans was alert once again with a smart save to deny Kehoe who had struck first-time as Nolan cut the ball back from the right. To their credit, Ascot limited any further damage although Nolan blazed over in added time after the home side had gifted possession with a stray cross-field defensive pass.

The home side must try to find a way of improving when they make the long trip to face newly-promoted Torquay United next weekend. Gwalia themselves didn't look as polished as expected, but they had far too much class for their hosts.

ESSENTIAL READING FOR FOLLOWERS OF THE NATIONAL GAME

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THERE is nothing quite like the FA Cup when it comes to serving up new stories every year.

It's not just the first round proper when a Non-League club who have battled through several games gets that dream EFL draw that captures the imagination of the TV chiefs. And it's not always about the, admittedly, vital prize money that means a club can improve their ground.

Sometimes it's the moments in the extra preliminary round that will last a lifetime to the people involved. Take the Wilkinson family. Bobby is well-known for his success in taking Hungerford Town up the leagues, promotion at Bracknell Town and a great escape with Weymouth.

Now managing at Swindon Supermarine, he had a day he'll never forget after giving his son Lucas his debut – who also scored! Wilkinson junior announced his arrival in style in their 3-1 extra preliminary round win over Tuffley Rovers.

As if a goal in your first appearance for your dad's team didn't have enough FA Cup magic already, it was also his 18th birthday!

It came with some more quirky coincidences. Born on the 8-8-2008, his goal – on 8-8-26 (the year added together also makes eight – came in the 88th minute! In fact all of the times of Southern League Division One South side's goals had an eight in it. And Lucas' lucky number is...eight!

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"I don't think that would have ever been done," Wilkinson senior laughed. "It's been getting lots of publicity. We were laughing as a family because I didn't want anyone to know anything about him – I was keeping him under my wing, guiding him slowly. Now everyone knows. So it was a surreal one on his birthday. No one can ever take that away from the Wilkinson family – we will always remember that moment."

"The club got the pictures and presented them to me which was a special moment in itself. My family means everything to me. They've followed my journey. For me, this is just about my son on that day. He earned it himself – it's nothing to do with his dad – and he deserves all the plaudits."

Wilkinson has two rules – he doesn't want to hear about what's going on in the dressing room and Lucas has to make his own way to and from training. Wilkinson added: "He gets is harder than anyone! He's a credit to work with and the boys love him. He's a good player first of all. For him to do that on his 18th birthday was a very special moment for the family."

More FA Cup tales will be written this weekend and continue to remind us why it's the best cup competition around ~ Matt Badcock.

Yellamen fight back to draw 3-3 despite 'keeper red card

Ascot United twice came from behind – despite the dismissal of goalkeeper Sam Swyer early in the second half, to salvage a remarkable 3-3 draw with Kingstonian on Tuesday evening. Trailing 2-1 and against the ropes, defender Regan Clark-Salter was forced to don the gloves after Swyer's red-card, but he and his side produced a truly heroic performance to earn a first point of the season.

Ascot seek to get off the mark

Following Saturday's reverse at Bedfont Sports, this was a chance to get some points on the board in their second league game of the season. Visitors Kingstonian had drawn their opening league game but had largely got the better of their hosts in the two seasons where they have faced off, including a league double in their favour last campaign. Naison O'Neill, Fope Deru and Ishmael Amiri came into the starting line-up in three changes since Saturday, whilst new addition Faleel Green was named as a substitute.

Action packed first half sees Kingstonian lead

After a fairly tepid opening quarter, the game burst into action when visiting 'keeper George Hill made a sprawling save to divert Quayee Vine's effort away; Vine himself following on Harley Platel's weak shot after Deru had squared from the right. But The K's were dangerous going forwards and Rocky Williams struck the inside of a post in the 21st minute – but that was only a warning – as Eddie Simon was brought down in the penalty area moments later before stepping up to convert the resultant spot-kick to give the visitors a 1-0 lead. But Ascot felt aggrieved in the 33rd minute when Isaac Brown charged down Hill's attempted clearance and struck the inside of the right-hand post – although what actually looked like the wheel behind the goal-line – not that the assistant referee had any chance of keeping up with play. Clark-Salter then cleared off the line for Ascot before Brown's low shot was tipped away by Hill as the sides traded chances. However, Williams scored from long range into the bottom right with Swyer rooted to his spot to double Kingstonian's advantage in first-half stoppage time – it looked as if that would be a killer blow – although Vine gave Ascot a lifeline barely a minute later when he checked from his right to his left foot and sat Hill down with a shot into the bottom right hand corner; 2-1 and very much game-on as the sides changed ends.

Scintillating, stunning, stirring second half display

Words alone will never do the second half justice.

It was barely a minute old when Swyer came charging from his area, came off worse in a foot race, and was given his marching orders for denying a clear goal scoring opportunity.

Cue Clarke-Salter – and he would impress in sticks – he needed to. Early doors, he would claim everything predictably thrown at him, and after surviving for ten minutes, the Yellamen were handed another lifeline when Deru was fouled by Hill in the box, and Vine nonchalantly rolled the resulting penalty into the bottom right; 2-2.

Incredibly, the Yellamen now looked more likely to score and with a brave, attacking mantra they unpicked the visitors defence courtesy of Deru and Brown's one-two – Deru fired hard and low – but Hill was equal to it.

But The K's would surely exploit the space afforded to them by Ascot's numerical disadvantage and when Williams turned provider for Splatt in the 65th minute, he hammered past Clarke-Salter at the near post to put his side 3-2 ahead.

Would that be one blow too many for the home side?

No.

Ascot never gave up, used their substitutes wisely, and even when Brown started limping around, he carried on gamely, even if it was now like nine-and-half men against eleven. And, their reward would come. Substitute Cameron Rohart-Brown would loop a diagonal ball over the visiting defence – it sat up – but Brown got over it and flicked it under Hill to level it up once again and spark pandemonium on and off the pitch. That goal came in the 83rd minute, but there were still fifteen further minutes played, given the overages.

Clarke-Salter, and his warriors in front of him, stood firm in a truly remarkable second half performance. All the hosts now need for their next game is a 'keeper. Or just start with ten men, including Clarke-Salter in the sticks...

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CLUB HISTORY - ASCOT UNITED

Ascot United as we know it, was founded in 1965 by a men's team who played their games at Sunninghill with "after match meetings" in The Wells in Cheapside village (now Mikado's). Teams played as long ago as 1928 under the name "Ascot United" but nothing to link them directly to the current club. In 1965, the club had gained permission from the Ascot Racecourse Trustees to convert the land east of coach park 10 into a football pitch. A wooden clubhouse was built, and this team went on to win many prestigious trophies in the years that followed.

Various youth teams represented Ascot United over the years up to 1988, and in 1992 the East Berks 7-a-side Association was formed by our then Chairman Keith Wicks, introducing small-sided junior games and having disbanded in 1980 the men's team also reformed. The men's senior team enjoyed early success through the East Berks League gaining continued promotions to the Senior division and winning various Cups including the Fielden Charity Cup in 1996/7. In 2001, the First Team join the Reading Senior League, were awarded FA Charter Standard status in 2004, and won the Reading Evening Post Senior Cup at the Madejski Stadium in 2006. Promotion to the Hellenic League Division 1 soon followed in 2007, before promotion to the Premier Division in 2009.

"The Yellamen" made their debut in the FA Cup in 2011 with a home tie against Wembley FC. The game attracted 1,149 people to The Racecourse on a Friday evening where the famous trophy itself was on display, and the match was streamed live on Facebook. In 2012-13 and 2015-16 we reached the Quarter Final of the FA Vase twice, enjoyed two top-three finishes in the UHlsport Hellenic League Premier Division, and won both the Bluefin Sport Challenge Cup and Perpetua Press Floodlit Cup. In 2018-19, new manager Jamie Tompkins led his side to the top of the table for long spells, and although they couldn't hang on to their lead, they would taste league cup glory once again by defeating Windsor FC 3-1.

A lateral move to the Combined Counties Premier Division for the 2019-20 season, combined with the installation of a new 3G pitch provided a platform for further development both on and off the pitch. The Yellamen were clear at the top of the league before COVID curtailed their first crack at the title before the 2021-22 season saw them reach the Bucks Senior Cup Final after defeating three sides from higher divisions, including Wycombe Wanderers in the semi-final in front of a club-record crowd of 1,267.

However, it is the 2022-23 campaign that will surely remain the club's most successful for decades to come. Tompkins' side dominated the league, taking 102 points from 38 league matches to win the title with four matches to spare. And if that wasn't enough, they achieved an incredible double by lifting the Isuzu FA Vase at Wembley in front of over 4,400 travelling Ascot United supporters and the BT Sport cameras. Impressively, they entered in the very first qualifying round before winning ten matches in a mesmerizing run; Kai Walters heading home in the 79th minute to secure a 1-0 win over the then-holders Newport Pagnell Town. After securing promotion to Step 4 for 2023-24 where they consolidated their status by finishing mid-table, they pushed for promotion again in 2024-25 only to lose at Hanworth Villa in a play-off semi final. The 2025-26 campaign saw Gavin Smith appointed as manager and consolidate his side's status at Step 4, before leading The Yellas in 2026-27 for their fourth season in the Isthmian League (South Central) Division.

The club has also enjoyed much success at all levels particularly in the Women's and Girls Section. Our Senior Women won promotion to the Premier Division of the Southern Region Women's Football League in 2017-18 where they were runners-up in both 2022-23 and 2023-24. However, an unbeaten league campaign saw them crowned champions in 2024-25, earning them promotion to the National League at Step 4 for the 2025-26 campaign, where manager Andy Cox led them to an impressive mid-table finish, also winning the County Cup. New manager Aym'e Melham took over the reins for the 2026-27 campaign with an entirely new squad and will also foster a pathway for the Junior Premier League (U18) players, who themselves also won the JPL league title in 2022-23 and 2024-25.

Ascot United has grown to become one of the largest Community football clubs in the UK with over 1,000 registered players and over 90 teams playing every weekend embracing all ages and abilities from 5 year olds through to veterans. We are also extremely proud to have a mixed-ability team representing our club, the Ascot United Warriors, who are affiliated with Special Olympics GB



CLUB HISTORY - PENN & TYLERS GREEN



A History of Penn & Tylers Green Football Club

Penn & Tylers Green Football Club is one of Buckinghamshire's oldest and most respected grassroots football clubs. Officially established in **1905**, the club has grown from a small village side into a thriving community organisation, providing football opportunities for hundreds of players of all ages while maintaining a proud tradition of sporting excellence and volunteer commitment.

Early Years (1905–1914)

Although football had been played in the villages before then, the club formally adopted its first constitution in **1905**, marking the beginning of its official history. Penn & Tylers Green quickly joined local competitions and achieved its first major success in the **1911–12 season**, winning the **Wycombe League** under the captaincy of George Slade, who would later become a renowned champion motorcyclist. This early triumph established the club as one of the leading teams in the district.

The War Years

Like many village clubs across Britain, Penn & Tylers Green suffered significant disruption during both the First and Second World Wars. Many players and club members served in the armed forces, with several making the ultimate sacrifice. The local cricket pavilion, which serves as a war memorial, stands as a lasting reminder of the community's losses during these difficult years.

Building a Permanent Home

For many years the club played on the village common before purchasing **French School Meadow** in **1949**. The ground takes its distinctive name from an eighteenth-century school established for the orphaned children of French émigrés following the French Revolution. The pupils wore blue uniforms with white trim, inspiring the club's famous blue-and-white colours and crest that remain in use today.

Throughout the following decades the club steadily improved its facilities. Showers were installed during the 1960s, a brick clubhouse was constructed in the 1980s, and the building was extended in 2001 to better serve players, members and the wider community.

League Progression

Penn & Tylers Green enjoyed consistent success in local football throughout the twentieth century, winning numerous Wycombe Combination titles and local cup competitions. A landmark moment came in **1984**, when the club became a founding member of the **Chiltonian League**, signalling its ambition to compete at a higher standard of non-league football.

Following the merger of the Chiltonian League with the **Hellenic League** in 2000, the club competed in Division One East and gradually established itself as one of the division's strongest sides. After finishing runners-up in 2002–03, Penn & Tylers Green achieved back-to-back league championships in **2015–16** and **2016–17**, earning widespread recognition for the quality of its football.

The club later joined the **Spartan South Midlands League** before moving into the **Combined Counties Football League**, where it continues to compete while striving for further promotion.

Growth Beyond the First Team

While success on the pitch has remained important, the club's greatest achievement has been its remarkable expansion as a community organisation. Today Penn & Tylers Green fields teams from youth football through to senior men's and women's football, with hundreds of players representing the club every weekend.

The reserve side has enjoyed considerable success, winning consecutive **Berks & Bucks Junior Cups** in **2013–14** and **2014–15**, while the women's section has developed rapidly since its formation. The women's first team secured promotion by winning the **Thames Valley Counties Women's League Division Three** in **2020–21** and lifted the **Berks & Bucks Women's Trophy** the following season.

A Community Club

Penn & Tylers Green FC has become far more than a football club. Its clubhouse and facilities serve as a focal point for village life, hosting community events, youth tournaments, charity activities and social gatherings throughout the year. The club's commitment to inclusivity, player development and volunteerism has earned it recognition as one of Buckinghamshire's leading grassroots football organisations.

Last Season

Penn & Tylers Green FC enjoyed one of the most successful seasons in the club's history during the 2025–26 campaign. Competing in the Combined Counties League Division One, the club secured the league title and earned promotion to Step 5 football for the first time.

The title was confirmed following a convincing 3–0 home victory over Wembley in April, before the team rounded off the league campaign with another 3–0 win against Oxhey Jets to celebrate lifting the championship trophy. Throughout the season, Penn demonstrated consistency at both ends of the pitch, combining a strong defensive record with an effective attacking style that kept them at the top of the table during the run-in. The 2025–26 season will be remembered as a landmark year for Penn & Tylers Green FC. Winning the league title and achieving promotion marked a significant milestone in the club's development and provided a platform for the next challenge in the Combined Counties Premier Division North.

Looking Ahead

More than 120 years after its formation, Penn & Tylers Green Football Club continues to balance tradition with progress. Investment in facilities, player development and coaching ensures that the club remains ambitious while preserving the values upon which it was founded: community spirit, sporting excellence and opportunities for players of every age and ability.

From humble beginnings on the village common to its modern home at French School Meadow, Penn & Tylers Green FC stands as a proud example of the enduring importance of grassroots football in England. As the club looks to the future, it remains committed to serving its community while building upon a rich and distinguished history that stretches back to 1905.

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
